

Bet Alpha has managed to capture quite a few positions on NCE's varsity athletic teams. In keeping with pace with past years, the basketball team has three Pi Kapp's on it - Steve De Steno, starting guard, Ken "Bo-Bo" Bigos, sixth man and Mike Saul, starter on the J.V. team. The baseball team has three good Frosh additions this year - Brothers Nick Taglianetti and Ted Cassera, and also Pledge Mike Saul. Brothers Bill Mokoid and Chuck Forman represent Pi Kapp on the varsity Tennis team, while Tom Herits and Ralph Doudera participate on NCE's Swimming and Rifle teams, respectively.

Our usually strong defense on the gridiron came through again this year. However, the lack of an adequate offense cost us the IFC championship. We placed third overall,

second in our division and lost only to Sigma Pi (13-0) and Tau Delt (6-0). Our record wound up to 6 wins and 2 losses. There was a sum total of 21 points scored against us throughout the season.
