

A BETA ALPHA IN LONDON

Greetings Brothers,

It has been over a year since I have moved to London I thought it would be good to share my experiences so far.

I came here on a 4-year international assignment with General Electric Co. I am the IT project manager responsible for setting up an institutional investment management office in London. Combining systems from offices in Germany, France, UK and the Netherlands all into one office here in London. So far the project is going well and we have integrated all the different businesses here on a common platform. The next step is to build a larger client base, which is the primary reason for creating this central office. It has been a challenging assignment, which has taught me many valuable project management lessons that I will carry forward as my career progresses.

One of the other challenges, I faced was moving to a new city. In Europe no less. It has taken sometime, but I have made some friends and have a nice social life here. I find the people in London very nice, and I haven't had any trouble meeting new people. Although it did help that I work for such a big company and actually know some people who work in other GE businesses here in London. My office is in Central London, very close to Big Ben, and Trafalgar Square. I have settled into a nice flat in Southwest section of London called Battersea, about 4 miles from the office. One of the biggest eve openers here is the cost of living in London. London is the second most expensive city in terms of cost of living, being trumped only by Tokyo. To put it in perspective New York City is Number 9 on that list. Prices are the same number wise, for example a beer will cost about 3 pounds (depending on how trendy the place is) however the dollar is weaker than the pound so it takes nearly two dollars to make a pound. That's right, 6-dollar beers! If that wasn't enough England is a pub society, with most social functions taking place in a pub, bar, or club. That leads to lots of drinking, even at lunchtime, that's right London is a budget buster!

Travelling around London is quite easy because of the great public transportation system. With buses, the underground, and overland trains, there is absolutely no need for a car. Which is good because gas prices are astronomical! With the price of gas here nearly \$8 a gallon! Not to mention parking fees, and the congestion charge which charges 8 pounds (nearly 16 dollars) to come into central London during peak commuting hours. That, along with small roads, are the major reasons Europeans drive such small cars.

Living in London has many other benefits as well. First and foremost is the history. Everywhere you

look you are reminded just how much history is in this city. I have the benefit of passing Westminster abbey, Big Ben, and the houses of Parliament every morning on my way to work. In fact I look at the clock every morning to see how late I am! Along with the great old architecture, there are many museums that house some great art. London is a very cosmopolitan city. With so many different cultures packed into the same city. you have the benefit of cuisines from everywhere in the World. Just this past weekend I was at a South African restaurant and had Kudu (an relative of the antelope) Steak. It was very good. Every cuisine from Indian, Thai, Chinese, Malaysian, African, French, even American BBO are available in the city, never a dull dining experience here! Being a sports fanatic has its benefits here as well, although I can't watch sports Like Baseball, and American Football (except on the internet). I have embraced the sports here such as football (Soccer), Rugby, and that's right Cricket. I enjoy the competition, and there is nothing like the experience of going to a live Soccer match. Its quite an experience listening to the crowd sing, and chant, and celebrate their teams. I have experienced nothing like it, even when I got a chance in 1996 to see the Yankees in the World Series. Its electric!

It is the kind of life education that you cannot measure. I would certainly recommend travelling to Europe if you are
