In our first issue of this newsletter (April 2006 which can be found on our website) we introduced you to NJIT's Redevelopment plans for the "Gateway Area". That area basically covers the ground between Route 280 and NJIT's border of Central Avenue. Since then a lot of progress has been made with the project.

Once you are on the above site click on project news. Under that heading view the NJIT Conceptual Rehabilitation Master Plan. This is a long document 55 pages in total. You can browse the first 44 at your own pace. To see how this directly affects Beta Alpha stop at the section that starts on page 45 and read carefully. You will notice that the first paragraph on page 47 brings the wrecking ball to our block on MLK Blvd and does not leave our building standing.

I was at the first meeting that the current president of NJIT ever had with the Greeks on this project. President Alternkirch and VP Bloom both stated that all Greek properties could opt into this project or not, that we could opt into the Greek village project or not and that they (NJIT) would never seek eminent domain to take our properties, but could not guarantee other developers or the city wouldn't. They also claimed the new Greek housing built at the Greek village had a lot of variables that we would all work out together in future meetings. The basics at that point headed in the direction of town house style buildings as previously been built on other campuses in the country. The Gateway committee then went on tours of some of those campuses. VP Bloom made it a point on several occasions to state that NJIT would not change the relationship they have with the Greeks currently, in regard to governance, no matter if you were in or out of the Greek village project.

Now that we are at the point in which NJIT has a conceptual plan submitted to the city of Newark, you would think that some of the details or variables would start to come to light. They have not. In fact the fraternities had little to no input on this conceptual plan. In our case, Jones Lang LaSalle who had the job of putting the plan together met with area property owners, but ignored Beta Alpha.

Some time ago a Greek Alumni Council was formed. Most of the Greek organizations are full participants of the GAC. The GAC has been asking the right questions to the right people thru letters and direct face to face meetings with NJIT's President and others. President Alternkirch has repeatedly stated that he does not have any answers to our questions. He defers questions that have to do with land ownership or leasing options, financing, building types, how many, square footage, building costs, etc...

A TIME FOR REFLECTION

This past Dec, Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity celebrated its 103rd anniversary. While this would be a notable birthday for any organization, it is especially remarkable for our Fraternity when you consider how it all began.

Three students at the College of Charleston in the Fall term of 1904, desiring each other's company, and bound through the bonds of fraternity, were motivated to change the campus culture by shaking up the well-established Greek system. We know from our history that Founder Kroeg was the oldest at nineteen, Founder Mixson - seventeen, and Founder Fogarty - sixteen, at the time of our founding. Upon reflection, it is nothing short of miraculous that we are connected, you and I, through the bond of brotherhood which was initiated by three energetic teenagers over a century ago.

The early days of Pi Kappa Phi were filled with uncertainty. In 1907 Pi Kappa Phi opened its second chapter at Presbyterian College. Between 1905 and 1908, the Fraternity had only recruited eighteen men and, in 1908 alone, recruited no one! It wasn't until 1909 and the chartering of Gamma (UC-Berkeley) that Pi Kappa Phi would find firmer footing. We also know that our Founders were not in complete agreement about the growth of the fraternity. Mixson and Fogarty preferred smaller schools in the South. Kroeg was the visionary, wanting to grow Pi Kappa Phi from its provincial roots and expand to campuses across the country. These competing visions directed how and where the fraternity would expand.

Today's Pi Kappa Phi, while dramatically different in scale and scope, is still the same organization at heart. We have chartered 207 chapters in our 103 year history. We are one of the ten largest national Greek letter Fraternities. Each year we have over 6,000 undergraduate men wear our letters at 140 campuses nationwide. We have over 73,000 living alumni and will, very soon, initiate our 100.000th brother. As Pi Kappa Phi enters its second century we are still committed to building lasting friendships but with a renewed vision to redefine fraternity as a lifelong brotherhood of leaders.

to the future builder/developer of the Greek village/Gateway sites. Currently there is no builder or developer slated for the project, it is still just a conceptual plan.

If we sit by and wait for those answers from a builder, we will be in a very precarious position. On one hand if we like all the options we can go with them. On the other hand if the options that are before us don't work for our chapter then we are behind the 8 ball. At the point in time a builder gets involved with such a large project they want their ducks in a row. As far as NJIT there is some information that they could give us before a builder signed on that would help tremendously. In either case, like the options or not, if we wait for those answers and we need to put capital together for a new building at the Greek village site or other, we will be 2-3 years behind on the fund raising.

The GAC has retained a law firm to give us legal advise. Most Greek organizations with property have put up \$1000.00 to start our legal fund. The goals of the GAC are in part to get the answers that we need to make an educated decision when the time comes about our property, to keep the lines of communication open between all Greek Organizations on campus, to protect

all of our properties from Eminent Domain, and to work the best deal for each chapter as they specifically need it.

The biggest rub here is that we can't get any answers from the Gateway Plans author, President Alternkirch. We understand that until a developer has signed on and bought into the conceptual plan that a lot of questions will remain unanswered. However, there are some items that can be discussed. He also refuses to acknowledge the GAC as the voice of the Greek Alumni. He has refused our requests at having JLL or the Administration come to one of our GAC meetings to present plans. Many Greeks are inferring things from these refusals. For instance, if the deal that will be dealt to the Greeks was everything they originally outlined, it would more than likely be appealing to most organizations. So why hold back on us when we would be behind his project? By keeping us in the dark many fear that the eventual situation won't be as they first outlined and may not be good for their chapters. Everyone feels that there is a middle ground that the president can meet us on. Just meeting with the GAC would be a start.

The picture that NJIT is painting is not one that contains the veil of secrecy that we are experiencing.

They state this plan has gone forward with participation from the Greeks. The truth is we have had little to no **real** input on the situation.

Hope is not lost. We are on the case. There are a lot of great alumni involved with the GAC from our chapter as well as the other Greek chapters on campus. The NJIT Alumni Association is supporting our efforts. (Although they are now taking heat from NJIT over their support) Everyone is working together feverously to protect our own. We all hope that the Greek village/Gateway project turns out as it was originally depicted at that first meeting years ago.

Until there is a deal on the table that we can accept or reject we must be ready to fight a possible eminent domain case. (the worst case scenario) The area is designated in need of rehabilitation. Eminent domain for the type of project outlined in NJIT's conceptual plan could only take place if they get the area designated in need of redevelopment. The notice for a hearing that would decide that would come in the mail postmarked only 10 days in advance. Knowing that, we can not let our guard down.

FINANCIAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Financial Planning Committee mentors the undergraduate chapter in their financial operations and decisions as well as aids the Corp. Treasurer in collecting funds. The committee also presents plans for long term financial security of the fraternity.

FOUNDERS DAY COMMITTEE

The Founders Day Committee plans, runs, and promotes the annual founders day celebration.

HOUSING COMMITTEE

The Housing Committee oversees the operation and maintenance of the chapter house. The Committee sets up work projects and coordinates all alumni & undergraduate volunteers needed for those projects as well as professional contractors when needed.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

The Membership Committee plans for

the expansion of the fraternity's membership, mentoring and overseeing the Undergraduate's recruitment policies and events. The committee provides support by means of workshops and other events to educate the undergraduates in the necessary skills, such as networking, in order to recruit new members. The Committee also investigates the potential of alumni initiations to expand membership.

NEW ALUMNI COMMITTEE

The New Alumni Committee coordinates with the undergraduate chapter to keep in close contact with recent graduates in order to inform them about alumni activities. The Committee sets up events, social gatherings and meetings to introduce the recent graduates to other more established alumni to facilitate networking and brotherhood.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

PI KAPPA PHI GOES TO NEW JERSEY



ON the twenty-ninth of May, nineteen hundred forty-eight another milestone was written into the history of Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity, with the installation of Beta Alpha Chapter at Newark College of Engineering, Newark, N. J. The ceremonies were conducted in the Hotel Essex House in Newark. This occasion marked the beginning of the third trip through the Greek alphabet in the naming of chapters and the first time in over ten years that Pi Kappa Phi has absorbed a local fraternity as one of its chapters.

Early in 1947 the local fraternity Phi Sigma Omega passed a resolution to look into national fraternities with the ultimate aim of being absorbed by one of them. After some prelim-inary investigation the matter was shelved for action during the next school year. During the early fall of that year, through the offices of William Hazell, Associate Dean, members of Phi Sigma Omega were put in contact with Brother Jack Mc-Cann. After several subsequent meetings with brothers of Pi Kappa Phi, including District Archon Stevens and Travelling Counsellor Charles Martin, the local petitioned the national council to be admitted into Pi Kappa Phi as a chapter. The council accepted this petition and immediately plans got under way for the installation of Beta Alpha Chap-ter.

Brother George Dib very ably "M.C.'d" the banquet which was held after the completion of initiation and installation ceremonies. Brothers from Alpha Upsilon, Alpha Mu, Alpha Tau and Alpha Xi as well as alumni in the area

Among the speakers were Dean Haz-ell, who welcomed Pi Kappa Phi to the campus in behalf of the college, and Executive Secretary, W. Bernard Jones, Jr., National Historian, John W. Deimler, and District Archon, John Stevens, who were the officiat-ing men at the installation.

The following officers were elected to steer the course of Beta Alpha's initial activities: Alfred Taboada, archon; Michael Bravette, treasurer; Frank Cozzarelli, secretary; Kort A. Gorshkoff, historian; James Gomes, chaplain; and William Schlosser, warden. Professor George Keefe was appointed chapter adviser of the group.

Newark College of Engineering, like Drexel and Brooklyn Poly, is an urban college in the asphalt campus class, being situated very close to the center of Newark, New Jersey. The little bit of clear ground that there was has recently disappeared under the construction work of the addition to the laboratory building. The college is expanding in other ways, also. A recent purchase of real estate from the City of Newark has made the college the dubious owner of an orphanage. This building has been the Newark Orphan Asylum for a great number of years and a landmark with a tower overlooking the city. Renamed Eberhardt Hall it will house the offices, a proposed cafe-teria, and other activities long missing at the school

due to lack of space.

The city commission of Newark passed a resolution commending the college for its work on the occasion of the 25th anniversary of the first graduating class of the twenty-nine year old school. There are about 1400 students enrolled in the day school and 1300 more attending the night school and the special courses of Newark Technical School, which was formed in 1885 and out of which the college grew. Technically a coeducational institution, the femin-ine section of the student body rarely has more than one or two girls per class. This is due to the fact that N. C. E. is an engineering college giving B.S. degrees in the four branches of the profession; mechan-ical, chemical, electrical, and civil. The new graduate school will present the first M.S. degrees next June. Of the seven fraternities on the campus there are now six nationals repre-sented.

Beta Alpha wishes to thank Alpha Xi for the swell job their initiating team did in installing the new member of the family and showing it the way on the road of friendship and fraternity.
