ing in Newark; count the figures in the monument in Military Park in Newark find sexy pictures and other stuff.

Q. What path did your life take after college?

A. From 1950-1952 I had two positions at companies; one at Essex Wire Corporation where I was involved with wire and cable production and New York Quinine and Chemical Works doing plant design and construction for pharmaceutical products and narcotics extraction (morphine, codeine and others).

I got married, found a job and in 1952 was hired by Union Carbide Corp. (the No. 2 chemical and plastics company in the world—pretty good for an NCE graduate.) My experience included the design of production facilities from the small facilities to multi-million dollar production facilities such as Phenol/Acetone, Bisphenol-A, various Phenolic Resin facilities, Polystyrene and Formaldehyde plant. All the process engineering concepts taught in the technical institutes were incorporated in the various plant designs in which I was involved at Union Carbide. I was Manager of Engineering with a staff of 100 people prior to joining the business team at the corporate headquarters in New York.

I retired from Union Carbide Corporation in 1991 after 39 years of service which included 23 years doing process and plant design engineering, 6 years on an Ethylene Oxide Derivatives Business Team as the product distribution manager. The Business Team was responsible for the all phases of the business. Finally, I spent 10 years as the patent manager for the Polyolefins Division


Q. How did you end up as a Patent attorney?

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NJIT'S OAK RESIDENCE HALL TO GO GREEN

NJIT students will have the option next fall to live in a energy and energy efficient technologies.

state-of-the-art, energy efficient, renewable energy building, thanks to \$1.6 million in funding from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA). The university's Oak Residence Hall upgrade project has been approved by the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities and the U.S. Department of Energy as one of seven projects in the \$20.6 million State Energy Program funded by ARRA.

The upgrade of the 25-year-old Oak Hall, scheduled for completion in 2010, is estimated to reduce electrical energy use by 50 percent and fossil energy use by 40 percent. According to Boris Shapiro, executive director of technical services and program project manager, the plan utilizes a number of innovative renewable



"NJIT's facilities team has created an energy improvement plan that utilizes an innovative mix of technology to upgrade operations and reduce the ecological footprint of this building," Shapiro said. "We expect Oak Hall to emerge as a model building that can be used to introduce energy efficiency concepts to the state's higher education community."

The technologies being used in the Oak Hall project include:

Demand-based controls, Solar Water Heating, Solar Photovoltaic, Regenerative Elevator Technology, Higher-efficiency Lighting.

NJIT IPHONE APPLICATION COURSE

If you have an idea for an iPhone application, but don't know how to make it happen, here's your chance. NJIT will again offer an online iPhone application development non-credit course. The 10-week online course will begin Feb. 1, 2010 and repeat again on March 15, 2010. An NJIT instructor will teach it and students who successfully complete it will receive a certificate and three continuing education units from NJIT.

The 30-hour, online training course teaches computer-savvy students how to design and implement iPhone and iPod Touch software using the Apple Software Development Kit. Students will learn how to create and deploy iPhone and iTouch applications on the software simulator and hardware devices. They will become active members of the



Apple University Developer Portal program and learn best practices to ensure that designed Apps are compliant with Apple's guidelines. Successful AppStore App submissions can potentially be offered through Apple as

paid, downloadable commercial software packages.

For information about the course, call 800-624-9850 or visit http://online.njit.edu/moodle. Applicants must have broadband access to the Internet and a Macintosh computer capable of running Mac OS X Leopard 10.5.7 or higher and an iPhone or iPod Touch. Successfully-trained students will have the opportunity to take on teaching roles in the upcoming classes.

"We're keeping pace with trends in entrepreneurship and small business development," said Gale Spak, associate vice president, NJIT's Division of Continuing and Professional Education, who oversees the program. "We're aware that many self-starters are striking it rich when iPhone users purchase apps because Apple permits developers to keep 70 percent of the revenue. We also know that industry sectors seek iPhone application developers," Spak added. Today companies are paying developers of one simple iPhone application \$40,000 or more, she said. That's why this development has been called the next gold rush. Companies such as Pizza Hut, Stanley Tools, Master Card and Zippo Lighter are moving forward with iPhone application development with the hope of creating young loyalists to their brands.

STATUS OF OUR CHAPTER HOUSE

Time is not always our friend. As the years move along for me injuries pile up faster. Recovery time after a nite out with the guys takes much longer. Trips to the doctor are more frequent. All of you reading this completely understand the affects of getting a bit older. Let's apply this to our chapter house. She was built in the 1880's and had buildings attached to her on both sides. She lost those attached neighbors decades ago. For the last 45 years or so she has been home to the greatest chapter in all of Pi Kappa Phi, The Beta Alpha chapter. Greatness aside there are certain particular burdens a fraternity chapter places on the structure it lives in that most other structures in the city never experience. Time has not been our chapter house's friend. I may be able to go to the doctor to get fixed up, but most of you will say some of my best years are still ahead of me. All of our chapter house's best years are way, way behind her.

It is not a secret. The chapter house needs to be rebuilt. There are zero redeeming qualities about the old girl. All the major systems need to be replaced. There isn't a square or plum wall or floor in the place. With a state of the art sprinkler system she has been taking care of our brothers as best she can, but time is not on her side. We have been propping her up now for years with the best minor repair projects we could handle. We have explored many options. There is no question that we need to build a new chapter house and say good by to the old gal that Beta Alpha called home for decades.

While we have been preparing to build a new chapter house we have been hit with some set backs and difficulties. A few years ago our property was targeted for the taking by the Newark school system. This project stopped us dead in our tracks as we scrambled for other options. When they lost their funding or political will for the project we took a very short sigh of relief and was then notified that we are in the middle of yet anther redevelopment project called the Gateway project. This project is bordered by 2 other projects, behind us the Newark Housing buildings are being torn down and redeveloped into townhouses and to the left of us the old Westinghouse complex is being turned into a transit village on top of the newly renovated and updated broad street station (it now has a light rail link to Penn Station).

The first phase of the Gateway project includes a Greek Village to be built on a NJIT parking lot on Warren Street. This really is the break we have been waiting for. Across the country when universities sanction a Greek village the Greek system flourishes, in every case. We have a chance to build the house we want, closer to the center of campus. There will be an area in front of the houses where the guys can play soccer or we can host alumni picnics. Think of it a place where you will feel it is appropriate to bring you wife and kids for a June picnic. Most of the major details are still not before us but we have taken all of the

necessary, preliminary steps possible. We have a seat at the table on the committee that developing Greek Village, not all NJIT fraternities do. NJIT has offered a term \$1/year long ground lease and has vowed that the terms of that lease will not change the current relationship/ governance of the fraternities who build in Greek Village. This point we are monitoring very carefully. We have come



up with preliminary proforma and realize that building a new fraternity house won't be cheap and will be a lot of work.


The only way we can build a new chapter house is through the hard work and monetary contributions of our alumni. There is no question this will be the house that Beta Alpha built. We extensively interviewed all the major firms that specialize in fundraising for Greek Chapter houses. We have hired the Laurus Group to perform a feasibility study to determine if our chapter has the man power and will to donate to a new chapter house campaign. Everyone will be contacted in one way or another and asked for their opinion. Soon you will be receiving a brochure that explains the Feasibility Study and has a survey for you to fill out and return.

It is really important that you return the survey so we can gather all of your input. Once again time is not on our side. We have to move rather quickly so that we have the ability to secure the best spot in the Greek village once the developers are ready to go forward with the project. Brother Jim Krucher has traveled to a few of the other universities that have recently built Greek villages and saw first hand how nice the houses are and he noted the boost each chapter received after moving in. He has also learned how groups that did not move into their respective Greek Villages found themselves unable to compete. We want to be able financially and organizationally to give the go ahead, if we choose, when the time is right to break ground.

This is a huge project, but let's remember that we are BETA ALPHA, the greatest chapter in all of Pi Kappa Phi.
