Other events that took place this semester were a visit from our Leadership Consultant Bryan Janzig. He provided great feedback as well as great resources that we will be able to consult going forward with our recruitment campaign. We completed our Ladder of Risk Program which was facilitated by Brother Ronaldo Guillen Jr. BA 618. Another important event was the departure of Brother Steven Tran BA 770 who joined the National Guard

and will be in boot camp at Fort Jackson for the next couple of months. The chapter wishes him the best of luck and he will be missed this Founders Day.

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BIKE A THON

At the end of the following day (at 5:30PM) we packed up and saw how successful the event truly was. With the help of Dave White we raised around \$280 on campus, as well as secured alumni donations for over \$1,000. That's right, over \$1,000 (this was completely thanks to Dave's communicating skills and the kindness of the donors). With these donations in place, Beta Alpha is now ranked 13th nationwide for total giving to Push for this semester. Since 2002, I have been volunteering at the breast cancer walk in Newark and since 2007 the brothers of Beta Alpha have been volunteering as well. Our help at the walk has also encouraged many more Greeks to do the same. With our volunteerism at the walks and our growing reputation with helping the American Cancer Society we were chosen to lead the first Relay For Life at NJIT.

Relay For Life is a 12 hour overnight walk to raise awareness for

cancer research, as well as remember those who have lost their battle with cancer or who are still fighting. The event also recognizes the men and women who give care and support to people fighting this disease. I was given the opportunity to be the event chairman, and with the help and support of my brothers, we made Relay For Life one of the most successful fundraising events on campus. We recruited over 350 people which made up 40 teams and raised around \$22,000. This event didn't just bring our brotherhood to-



gether, but it also brought the entire community together.

The teams that attended Relay came from NJIT, Rutgers, Essex County College, UMDNJ, and the surrounding community. Without the brothers of Pi Kappa Phi Beta Alpha this event would not have happened.

This year, the brothers of Beta Alpha have been asked to help out and also mentor the next group of volunteers who will be working on the Relay For Life. I am happy to say that this event, started by Pi Kappa Phi, will be left as an enduring tradition for many years to come.
